SUTHERLAND WAS DEFEATED AT THE HANDS OF PETERSON IN THEIR FIRST GAME OF THE SEASON.

A FAST CALUMET TEAM DEFEATED THE TIGERS TO THE TUNE OF 34-21.
RONNIE GILLESPIE WAS HIGH POINT MAN, COLLECTING 9 POINTS.

SUTHERLAND WAS BEATEN BY THE CLEGHORN FIVE 39-32. LESLIE HILL WAS HIGH SCORER FOR THE TIGERS WITH 9 POINTS.

MERIDEN DEFEATED SUTHERLAND 25-19. THE POINTS WERE FAIRLY WELL DIVIDED AMONG THE SUTHERLAND TEAM. WAGGONER AND GILLESPIE WENT OUT OF THE GAME VIA THE FOUL ROUTE.
