





FOOTBALL

PROSPECTS WERE NOT TOO BRIGHT FOR THE TEAM THIS YEAR. ONLY FOUR LETTERMEN RETURNED. THEY WERE MERWIN ANDERS, DON SIMPSON, NED HILL AND LEONARD BRANSTETTER. THE REST OF THE SQUAD INCLUDED WILBUR MARTIN, DONALD PETERS, TOM DOLING-SENIORS; GLEN WAGGONER, DELBERT MARTIN-JUNIORS; BURDETTE PETERSON, DEAN SIMPSON, KENNETH LEMKE, VERNON EBEL, ROBERT WATSON-SOPHOMORES; EDWARD CHESLEY, CHARLES ZAHRENS-FRESHMEN.

PETERSON JOURNEYED TO THE TIGERS HOME FIELD TO ATTEMPT A WIN AFTER LAST YEAR'S 20-2 DEFEAT. THEY SUCCEEDED 14-0.

THE FOLLOWING WEEK THE TIGERS JOURNEYED TO CLEGHORN AND WERE AGAIN DEFEATED 14-7. CLEGHORN'S OUTSTANDING OFFENSIVE MAN WAS PAULSEN, AND NED HILL WAS OUTSTANDING FOR SUTHERLAND.

THE WIN-STARVED TIGERS NEXT JOURNEYED TO MILFORD AND WERE SENT HOME BEATEN 6-0. THE GAME WAS VERY EVEN UNTIL THE THIRD QUARTER WHEN MILFORD WAS ABLE TO PUSH OVER A TOUCHDOWN BUT WAS UNABLE TO CONVERT BECAUSE OF A STRONG SUTHERLAND LINE.

HARTLEY WAS NEXT ON THE LIST, AND AS IT TURNED OUT THE NEXT DEFEAT 7-0. M. ANDERS WAS SUTHERLAND'S OUTSTANDING BLOCKING BACK.

PRIMGHAR, OUR NEXT OPPONENT, WAS CONFIDENT OF AN EASY VICTORY, AND WAS STUNNED BY L. BRANSTETTER'S 81 YARD RUN, AND D. MARTIN'S 79 YARD RUN DOWN THE SIDELINES. ALTHOUGH SUTHERLAND COMPLETELY OUT-PLAYED PRIMGHAR IN THE FIRST HALF THEY WERE BEATEN 27-13. B. CASSIDY WAS OUTSTANDING FOR PRIMGHAR.

THE TIGERS, WEARY FROM THEIR OUTSTANDING GAME AGAINST PRIMGHAR, WERE BEATEN BY ALTA, THE CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS 14-7, ALTHOUGH THEY PLAYED AN OUTSTANDING DEFENSIVE GAME. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE GAME WERE BRANSTETTER'S 52 YARD TOUCHDOWN PLUNGE AND D. PETER'S OUTSTANDING TACKLE OF BAUMAN AT THE CLOSE OF THE GAME.

THE NEXT ENCOUNTER WAS THE OLD GRUDGE BATTLE WITH PAULLINA. THE BLUE AND WHITE, FURIOUS FROM THEIR FORMER BEATINGS BY THE TIGERS DEFEATED THEM 41-0. SUTHERLAND WAS HANDICAPPED BY TWO INJURED MEN, D. MARTIN AND L. BRANSTETTER.

THE VICTORY-STARVED TIGERS FINALLY MANAGED TO PULL ONE GAME OUT OF THE FIRE. THEY FOUGHT SIDUX RAPIDS TO A 12-0 VICTORY. SCORING TOUCHDOWNS FOR SUTHERLAND WERE M. ANDERS AND N. HILL.

THIRTEEN LETTERS WERE AWARDED TO MEMBERS OF THE SQUAD THIS YEAR: SENIORS-WILBUR MARTIN, DON SIMPSON, DONALD PETERS, MERWIN ANDERS, AND TOM DOLING; JUNIORS-NED HILL, LEONARD BRANSTETTER, GLEN WAGGONER, AND DELBERT MARTIN; SOPHOMORES-BURDETTE PETERSON, DEAN SIMPSON, VERNON EBEL, AND BOB WATSON.

BASKETBALL

PROSPECTS FOR THIS YEAR'S BASKETBALL SEASON LOOKED PRETTY BRIGHT. WINNING ONLY TWO GAMES LAST YEAR THE TIGERS WERE LOOKING FOR REVENGE. THE FOUR LETTERMEN WHO RETURNED WERE OSCAR ADAMS, NED HILL, LEONARD BRANSTETTER, AND DELBERT MARTIN. IN ADDITION, MERWIN ANDERS, KENNETH LEMKE, BOB WATSON, GORDON WARREN, WENDELL MILLER, WILBUR MARTIN, JAMES RECKOFF, JAMES NEGUS, AND GLEN WAGGONER HELPED TO BRIGHTEN THE OUTLOOK FOR THE YEAR.

THE TIGERS FIRST GAME WAS WITH CALUMET. SURE OF A VICTORY, THEY WERE DOWNED BY A FAST-MOVING CALUMET "FIVE." THE HALF-TIME SCORE WAS 17-4, AND AS THE FINAL WHISTLE SOUNDED THE SCORE STOOD AT 32-12 IN CALUMET'S FAVOR. HIGH POINT MAN FOR THE LOCAL BOYS WAS MARTIN WITH 4 AND BRANSTETTER WITH 3 POINTS. CALUMET'S HIGH-SCORER WAS MEHRENS WITH A TOTAL OF 15 POINTS.

The NEXT GAME WAS A HOME GAME WITH CLEGHORN WHO HAD A DEFINITE ADVANTAGE OVER OUR BOYS IN HEIGHT. THE FIRST TEAM GAME ENDED WITH A CLOSE 29-24 VICTORY FOR CLEGHORN. THE HIGHEST SCORER WAS BRAN-STETTER WITH 8 POINTS AND SMITH WITH A TOTAL OF 14 FOR CLEGHORN.

OUR NEXT GAME BROUGHT MILFORD, THE NEW S.V.C. RIVALS TO THE HOME FLOOR. THEY PROVED TO BE A FAST-MOVING "FIVE," BUT, IN SPITE OF THIS FACT, THEY WON BY ONLY AN EIGHT POINT MARGIN, THE FINAL SCORE BEING 27-35.

NEXT IN LINE WAS ALTA WHO ALSO JOURNEYED HERE TO PLAY ON THE TIGERS HOME FLOOR. AT THE HALF THE SCORE WAS 10-20 AND AT THE CLOSE OF THE GAME THE SCORE-BOARD SHOWED A 15-31 VICTORY FOR THE VISITORS.

THE NEXT RIVAL ON THE LIST WAS PRIMGHAR, AND IT REALLY TURNED OUT TO BE A REGULAR BATTLE. AS THE FINAL WHISTLE BLEW THE SCORE STOOD AT 21-21, BUT AT THE END OF THE OVER-TIME THE PRIMGHAR TEAM WERE IN THE LEAD BY ONLY TWO POINTS.

HARTLEY WAS EASILY SUBDUED BY BOTH THE FIRST AND SECOND TEAMS-THE SECONDS WINNING 28-18 AND THE FIRST TEAM 30-24. WILBUR MARTIN WAS HIGH POINT MAN FOR THE SECOND TEAM WITH FOUR FIELD GOALS AND TWO FREE THROWS. LEMKE'S COMING IN DURING THE LAST QUARTER AND MAKING 10 POINTS PUT THE GAME IN THE BAG. ADAMS WAS HIGH POINT MAN WITH A TOTAL OF 12 POINTS.

SUTHERLAND FEELING PRETTY CONFIDENT AFTER THEIR FIRST VICTORY WAS CERTAIN OF ANOTHER FROM SANBORN WHO APPEARED NEXT ON THE LIST. BOTH SANBORN TEAMS WENT HOME BEATEN-THE SECOND TEAM 14-12 AND THE FIRST TEAM 20-19.

BASKETBALL (CONTINUED)

THE SUTHERLAND TIGERS DREW PAULLINA AS THEIR FIRST CONTESTANT IN THE FIRST ROUND OF THE COUNTY TOURNAMENT. AT THE END OF THE FIRST HALF THE SCORE STOOD AT 15-15.
