
THIS YEAR THE JUNIOR HIGH. WITH MISS SCHULLER AS PRINCIPAL, TOTALED 31 IN NUMBER, 13 IN THE SEVENTH GRADE AND 18 IN THE EIGHTH GRADE. THEIR FOOTBALL TEAM PLAYED FOUR GAMES. THEY WERE VICTORS ONCE DURING THE SEASON WINNING OVER HARTLEY. THEIR BASKETBALL SEASON PROVED TO BE MORE SUCCESSFUL AS THEY WON FOUR OUT OF SIX GAMES. THEY WERE RUNNERS-UP IN THE COUNTY TOURNAMENT, DEFEATING ARCHER IN THE OPENING ROUND, HARTLEY IN THE SEMIFINALS, AND LOSING TO CALUMET IN THE FINALS, 12 - 7. MR. BAIRD WAS COACH OF BOTH THE FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL SQUADS.








PRACTICE FOR THE S. H. S. 1945 FOOTBALL SEASON WAS OPENED ON AUGUST 29, A WEEK BEFORE THE OPENING OF SCHOOL. THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL SAW A TOTAL OF 25 HAIL AND HARDY TIGERS READY TO FIGHT AND WIN LAURELS FOR S. H. S. OF THESE, 10 WERE LETTER-MEN: SENIORS, DEAN SIMPSON, BOB WATSON, BURDETTE PETERSEN, JAMES NEGUS, GORDON WARREN, ELDRED GAUDIAN; JUNIORS, ED CHESLEY, GORDON HILL, CHARLES ZAHRENS; SOPHO-MORE, JAMES JENSE, AND 8 WERE EXPERIENCED, HAVING SEEN ACTION IN PREVIOUS YEARS. FOR SEVEN OF THE BOYS REPORTING, 5 FRESHMEN AND 2 SOPHOMORES, IT WAS THEIR FIRST SEASON OF HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL. THE TIGERS FACED A TOUGH SEVEN GAME SCHEDULE, SEASON OF HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL. SIX CONFERENCE AND ONE NON-CONFERENCE GAMES.

SUTHERLAND 19 - PETERSON O

THE SUTHERLAND TIGERS WON THEIR OPENING GAME OF THE GRIDIRON SEASON ON THE HOME FIELD WHEN THEY DEFEATED PETERSON IN A NON-CONFERENCE GAME 19 - 0. ALL THREE OF THE TIGER'S COUNTERS WERE MADE BY JENSEN, THE SECOND ON A 70 YARD SPRINT. THE "RUBIS-MEN" SHOWED UP WELL ON DEFENSIVE ACTION IN THIS GAME, NEVER ALLOWING PETERSON TO GET WITHIN SCORING DISTANCE OF THE "ORANGE AND BLACK" GOAL, BUT THEY LACKED NECESSARY OFFENSIVE PUSH AGAINST THEIR WEAKER OPPONENT WHICH SHOULD HAVE NETTED THEM A MUCH LARGER SCORE. BUT ALL IN ALL, THE TIGERS SHOWED UP WELL AND PLAYED A GOOD GAME CONSIDERING IT WAS THE FIRST TILT OF THE SEASON.

SUTHERLAND 6 - MILFORD 20

THE TIGERS LOST THEIR FIRST CONFERENCE GAME OF THE SEASON AT THE HANDS OF A STRONG MILFORD "II", 20 - 6. THE "RUBISMEN" WERE HELD SCORELESS IN THE FIRST QUAR-TER WHILE MILFORD COLLECTED ONE TOUCHDOWN. BOTH TEAMS FAILED TO SCORE IN THE SECOND QUARTER AND THE HALF ENDED 6 - 0, MILFORD. THE TIGERS CAME BACK STRONG IN THE THIRD QUARTER AND JENSEN INTERCEPTED A PASS ON THE TWO YARD LINE AND GALLOPED 98 YARDS FOR THE ONLY SUTHERLAND MARKER. IN THE LAST QUARTER THE TIGERS WERE UNABLE TO COPE WITH THE EXPERT BLOCKING AND TACKLING OF THEIR OPPONENT AND MILFORD SCORED TWICE ON A SERIES OF LONG RUNS.



SUTHERLAND 0 - HARTLEY 20

HARTLEY RECEIVED THE KICKOFF AND MARCHED STRAIGHT DOWN THE FIELD BUT WERE STOPPED JUST INSIDE THE 20 YARD LINE. THE TIGERS KICKED OUT BUT WERE UNABLE TO STOP THE HAWKS ON THEIR SECOND DRIVE AND HARTLEY SCORED AND MADE THE EXTRA POINT. THE OPPONENTS SCORED ONCE MORE IN THE SECOND QUARTER ON A PASS. THE "RUBISMEN" THREATENED LATE IN THE QUARTER BUT FAILED TO SCORE BEFORE THE HALF ENDED, 13 - 0. HARTLEY SCORED AGAIN IN THE THIRD PERIOD ON A 40 YARD PASS AND RUN. THE TIGERS THREATENED AGAIN LATE IN THE QUARTER AFTER A SHORT FLAT PASS AND RUN OF 30 YARDS, BUT AGAIN LACKED THE NECESSARY POWER INSIDE THE 20 YARD LINE TO SCORE.

SUTHERLAND 20 - PRIMGHAR 6

IN THIS GAME THE UNDER-RATED S. H. S. "ELEVEN" PROVED THEMSELVES CAPABLE OF CARRYING ON THE TRADITIONAL "ORANGE AND BLACK" BANNER OF VICTORY AND THEIR ABILITY TO FILL THE SHOES OF TEAMS OF PREVIOUS YEARS. THE "RUBISMEN" SCORED TWICE IN THE FIRST QUARTER. PRIMGHAR SCORED IN THE SECOND QUARTER AND THE HALF ENDED, 14 - 6. THE TIGERS SCORED THEIR THIRD AND LAST TOUCHDOWN IN THE FOURTH QUARTER AFTER ANOTHER DRIVE OF SHEER POWER PLAYS WHICH COVERED APPROXIMATELY 50 YARDS. PRIMGHAR WAS HELD SCORELESS DURING THE LAST HALF.








SUTHERLAND 19 - SIOUX RAPIDS 21

TWENTY-THREE ANXIOUS BOYS ANSWERED COACH RUBIS! CALL FOR A BASKETBALL TEAM. OF THESE, 5 WERE LETTERMEN. THEY WERE SENIORS, KENNETH LEMKE, BOB WATSON, GORDON WARREN; JUNIOR, EDDIE CHESLEY, AND SOPHOMORE, JIM JENSEN. FIVE OTHERS SAW CONSIDERABLE ACTION LAST YEAR, BUT DID NOT QUALIFY FOR LETTERS. They were James Negus, Russel Gerrard, Glen Hakeman, Gordon Miles and Wendell Miller. For thirteen others, 2 Juniors, 2 Sophomores, and 8 Freshmen, it was the FIRST SEASON OF HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL.

SUTHERLAND 21 - MARATHON 38

THE S. H. S. "CAGERS" SUFFERED A DUAL DEFEAT IN THEIR OPENING GAMES OF THE season at Marathon by a tall, Lanky "Maroon and White" 5. The scores were Marathon 38, Sutherland 21 for the first string and Marathon, 21, Sutherland 6 for the seconds. The "Rubismen" were hampered a great deal by the absence of Bob Watson, CENTER, OUT BECAUSE OF FLU AND GORDON WARREN, GUARD, WHO WAS RECOVERING FROM A FOOTBALL INJURY.

WINNING GROUP WAS THE CLASS OF "16."


















